Term 3 Academic Highlights

Many students are coming to the end of their time at Bishopstrow this term. This therefore provides an excellent opportunity to look back at the progress they have made. There have been huge improvements in their confidence to interact and communicate; and tremendous progress in English, subject knowledge and in understanding of expectations in learning and behaviour. Whilst most students have by this point already completed their application process to their destination schools, there are still some students who are going through the decision process. They will be completing entrance exams, conducting interviews and completing school tours – supported by teachers and College staff at each step.

A select group of Seniors students are preparing to sit their IGCSE exams in May and June. This of course means a great deal of hard work in class with lots of additional revision. It also means that teachers are providing additional support to ensure their students get the best results possible.

We also have a number of new students joining us – just like we do every term at Bishopstrow. So, for these students, it's a case of commencing their pathway to their next school by making new friends, getting to grips with the College's conventions and school life in the UK. Fortunately, because bespoke support is the norm at Bishopstrow, no matter when students arrive, the level of support is the same and we can quickly help new arrivals become familiar and settled.

Approaching the mid-point of this term, we will soon be running the first "Off Timetable Day" of Term 3. This is a day of academic activity away from the usual syllabus, which enables students to have a bit of a break – albeit at school! This half-term, the Off Timetable Day is a Maths-themed day, with activities including an "Escape Room" and a project to create a biscuit and packaging.





Our sports programme provides plenty of opportunities for students to hone their skills and to be introduced to new sports.

The range of talents is an incredible feature of the students at Bishopstrow! Whatever the sport - familiar or brand new - students grasp the challenge with both hands and make fantastic progress.

This term has seen three new units of sport. First up was **net games**, focussing on **volleyball** and **tennis** - with varying degrees of experience throughout the student body - culminating in a fiercely competitive and high performing inter-house event where honours were shared between our four houses - Blake, Newton, Nightingale and Pankhurst. Next was **striking and fielding**, with the introduction of **cricket** and **rounders**, both staples of British school life, but slightly less familiar to our students. None the less, they quickly picked up the skills needed and were playing some brilliant stuff. Last, but by no means least was **athletics**, in preparation for the final part of our inter-house competition, Sports Day, the final event of our sports calendar this term and a time for everyone to give it one last shot to bring their house glory.

Activities Programme - Baking



Our Activities Programme provides a fantastic opportunity for students to do some thinking 'outside-the box'! Extra-curricular activities provide the opportunity for students to enjoy 'enrichment' outside their academic classes and to use or learn different skills. We like to try and provide a platform for students to express their creative side and are blessed to have a group of students whose imagination is limitless!

In Baking Club, which occurs weekly, they not only make something delicious to eat, but have the opportunity to learn a new life skill and, as is the case with everything we do at Bishopstrow, a chance to learn some new English vocabulary and expressions.

The students have been working hard mixing, chopping, baking and whisking and have produced some culinary masterpieces, notably bread dough (turned into pizzas), muffins, jam tarts (made from freshly made pastry), cookies and loaf cakes.





Activities Programme - Games Club

Games Club is one of the more low-key activities at the College, providing an opportunity for students to sit down and enjoy a variety of traditional board games and quizzes,

A particular favourite this term has been the discovery of Cluedo by a group of budding detectives amongst the student body! Meanwhile, Dobble, a game of matching symbols and quick reactions, is always top of the list, whilst Monopoly, the classic property development game is always a firm favourite. Students have also been creative in developing their own board games question-based, safari quests, wizard themes to name a few - with a whole mix of fantastic ideas shared amongst the group.

In short, Games Club provides students with the opportunity to be put their competitive gaming skills to the test and to be creative, whilst having some fun and on many occasions, plenty of laughs!

Alsama Institute Update



Finally, you may recall that at the start of the global pandemic in March 2020, when we moved our provision online, we welcomed three Syrian refugee students to Bishopstrow Online. Hadeel, Lujain and Aseel had fled the Syrian Civil War with their families, travelling to Beirut, Lebanon and 'settling' in the Shatila refugee camp. With limited access to schools in Beirut, a number of volunteers established the Alsama Institute to provide a basic education to the refugee children in Shatila. Hadeel, Lujain and Aseel enrolled with Bishopstrow on a pro bono basis, having spent some time at Alsama Institute.

After a year studying online with Bishopstrow and having made real progress with their English, Hadeel and Aseel were able to secure entry to Brummana High School - a prestigious British international school in Lebanon - to study IGCSEs over two years. Hadeel will follow a similar path in September 2022. Whilst at Brummana, the girls have had to pursue their own fundraising to support the cost of their education.

After Brummana, we would like to offer the opportunity for Hadeel, Lujain and Aseel to study A Levels at Padworth College, Bishopstrow's 'sister school' in the UK. We have already publicised our partnership with Alsama Institute as being the key charitable initiative at both Bishopstrow and Padworth and are working with Alsama to try and raise the funds required to cover some of the cost of the girls' sixth form education at Padworth.
